

## Cloud Computing for Art Galleries

A term often used when referring to computer systems and their operation is ‘*operating in the cloud*’. You may ask yourself ‘what is ‘the cloud’? Here are some definitions to help clarify:

*“The cloud is a set of services and technologies that enable the delivery of computing services over the Internet in real-time, allowing end-users instant access to data and applications from any device with Internet access.”* ([www.novell.com](http://www.novell.com))

*“Cloud computing encompasses any subscription-based or pay-per-use service that, in real time over the Internet, extends IT’s existing capabilities.”* ([www.infoworld.com](http://www.infoworld.com))

The cloud can be accessed from any location with an Internet connection whether work or home, or from mobile devices. The convenience of running your software through Internet-based applications rather than from your Mac or PC makes it an attractive and flexible option that more and more businesses are using.

Some of the benefits of running your application in the cloud are:

- Anywhere/anytime access to data
- Improved reliability and security of data
- Software that’s up-to-date with less malware
- Cloud computing requires less in-house staff
- Easy, fast deployment of users
